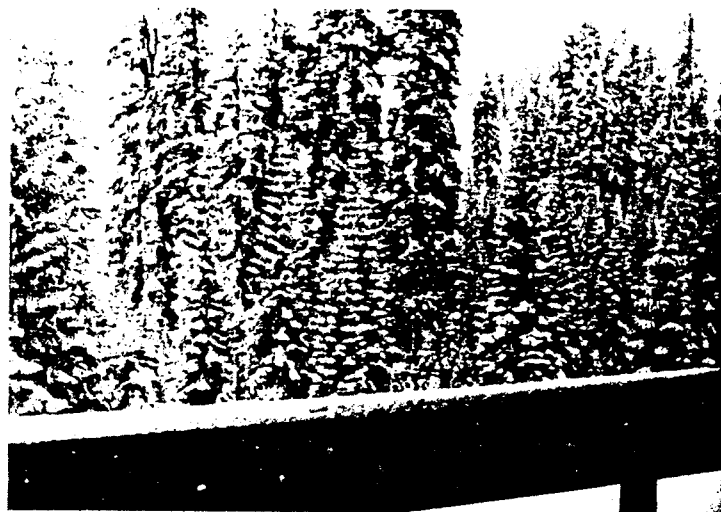
CAMPFIRE

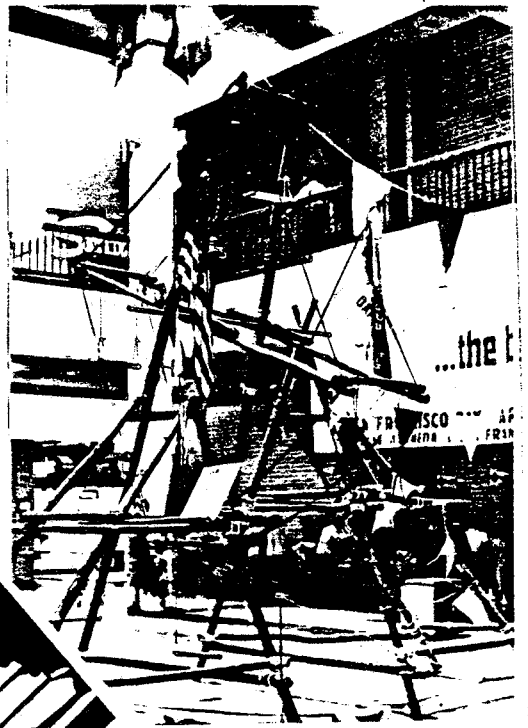

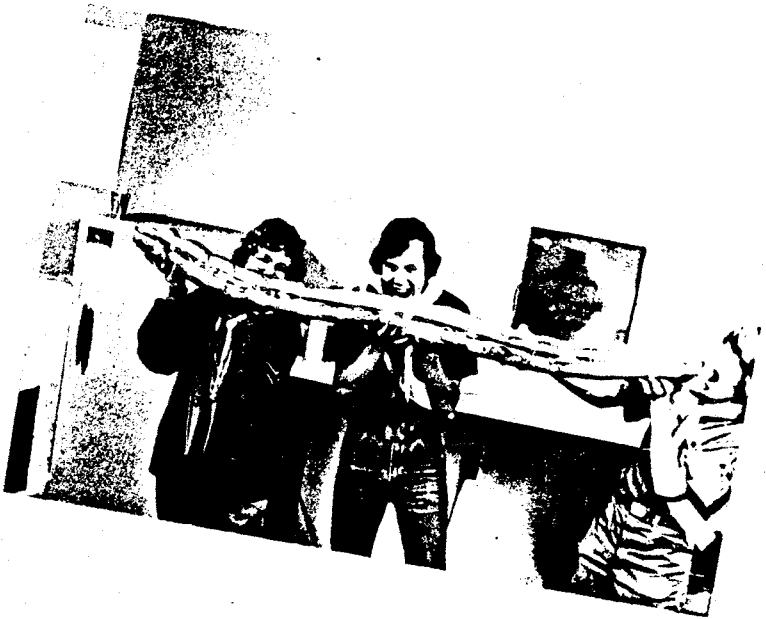
Ceremonies

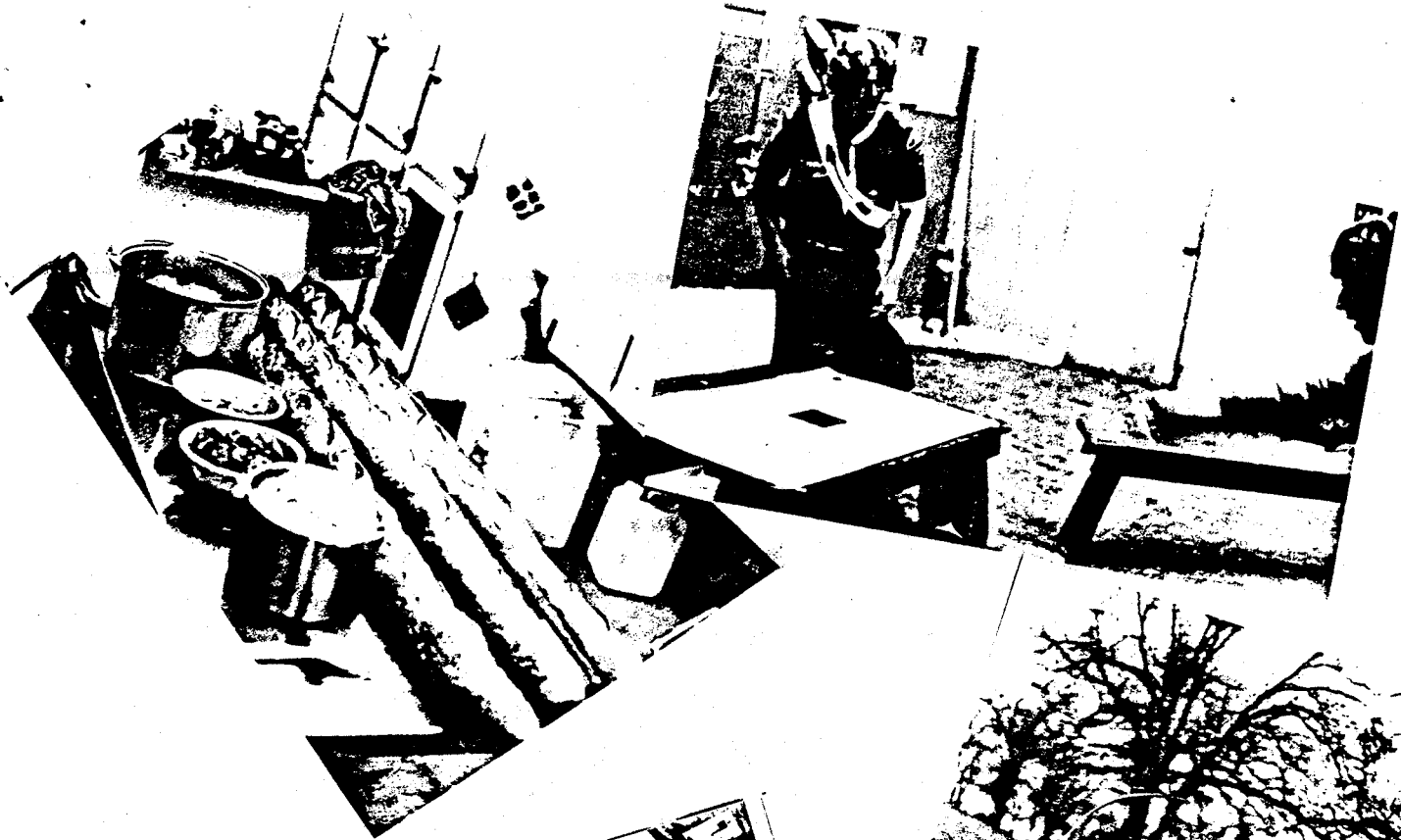

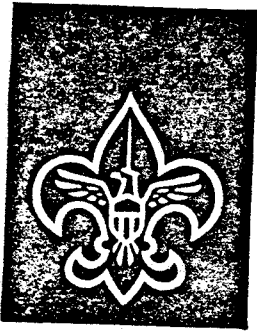
